Arsenal were given a humi-Arsenal were given a numiliating lesson in the arts of total football by the richly talented Moscow Spartak side in their first round second leg UEFA Cup tie at Highbury last night. The Russians deservedly earned a standing ovation from the 28,455 crowd at the end of a thrilling 5-2 victory, the qua-lity of which made Arsenal look ponderous and out of date by comparison.

Any one of the goals—by Rodinov (two), Cherenkov, Shavlo, or Gess — would serve as a textbook example of world-class soccer. Arsenal's reply, through Whyte and Chapman, was small consolation for the damage inflicted by a Spartak side that revived memories of Dinamo Tbilisi's triumph at West Ham two years ago.

Any notion that Spartak would merely defend their onegoal lead from the first leg was dispelled by the speed and invention with which they re-peatedly ripped holes in the creaking Arsenal defence. The talented midfield trio,

Shavlo, Gess and Cherenkov showed impressive vision and timing as they released the strikers Gavrilov and Rodionov into unmarked space on the flanks and through the middle.

Arsenal's defenders were often forced to sprint 40 or 50 yards back towards their own by-line in pursuit of players who always seemed to have a yard to spare. Once Arsenal had fallen behind, the Soviets seemed to find even more free-dom, with Arsenal seeking an equaliser.
